In the business of non-profit childcare and trauma-focused treatment, there are highs and lows – We experience mountains and valleys. We get our share of success and failure. We learn, and we grow as an organization.

We know that we are a part of an opportunity that alters the lives of children in a beautiful way. My staff and I celebrate those moments.

Teenagers are interesting people: On the outside, they often give the appearance of being well-put-together and having knowledge of all things to a greater depth than adults. When I see that, I smile, because we know about the abuse history and their shattered hearts. We are thrilled that Shults-Lewis is one of the places where a kid can come as they are, and where we meet them where they need to be. We will give them love daily value them endlessly and show them respect that comes from the lifestyle of a Child of God.

Our numbers have increased, and we are super happy about it. We are here, ready to help brokenhearted teenagers who most people would not give a second chance. We are skilled and trained to provide trauma treatment for those children. We do our part, and God sets everything else in place.

We still need your help to provide trauma treatment services to children who do not have the financial means to attend a treatment facility. Sponsoring a child is a form of help that will make a huge difference. If you would like to help in this way, please feel free to give me a call. Also, we enjoy taking our kids out in the community to learn independent living skills and experience the world with supervision. You may help with that also if you'd like. This part of our program provides activities for our kids, so they have some normalcy, just like other kids. They have the beautiful Shults Lewis support from my team and me. We love serving children and finding ways to ease their sorrows.

Leo has been in our treatment program for two years. We had a positive impact on his progress with dealing with his trauma. I had the privilege of spending time with him and see how he has healed and matured since being with us. He has been reunited with his adoptive family. When he left he stated "thank you for everything you have done for me".

Thank you for helping us with our mission and for making our vision possible for these young lives. We appreciate you taking this journey with us. Please pay for the children we serve and our treatment team. We will forever be grateful.



HONORING THE LEGACY OF SHULTS-LEWIS THROUGH HISTORY AND FAITH

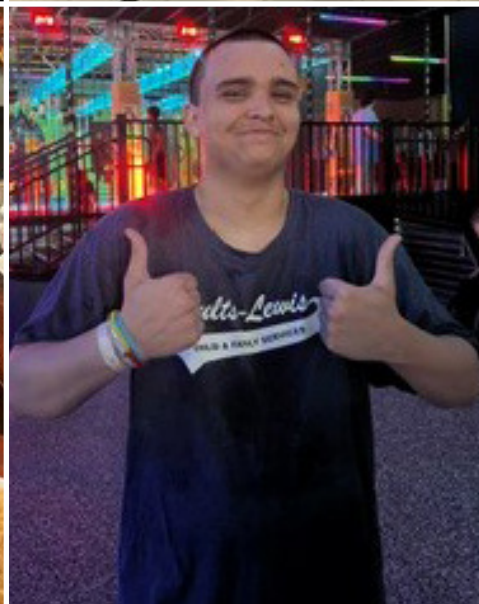
Through it all, our focus remains on building a strong, compassionate environment where young people can grow, support one another, and develop the skills they need for the future.
